

Spring is, without a doubt, the busiest time of year in the high school. Please note the following dates as we approach the end of the school year:



April 27: Prom, Grand March begins at 6 p.m. in the

Fine Arts Center. The dance will be held at The Falls from 7-11 p.m. Students will provide their own transportation, since it's in-district. No one will be admitted after 7:15 p.m, and if a student wishes to leave early, they must have parent consent. Anyone who leaves will not be readmitted

May 1: Senior Scholarship and Awards Night, 7 p.m., Fine Arts Center. Seniors should arrive no later than 6:45 p.m. Any senior receiving a scholarship must attend. Business apparel is required for seniors–no jeans, flip-flops, t-shirts

May 6-17: Advanced Placement Exams

May 8: Academic Awards Banquet, High School Commons. Meal begins at 6:30 p.m. Program begins after everyone is served and seated

May 15: Baccalaureate, 7 p.m. Alliance Church of the Valley in St. Croix Falls

May 20-21: Senior final exams

May 22: Senior class trip

May 22-23: Finals for grades 9-11

May 23: Students' last day

May 24: Graduation. Graduation practice is at 10 a.m. All graduates must attend. This is required to participate in the graduation ceremony. Commencement begins at 7 p.m. in the gymnasium. Seniors need to be at the school at 6 p.m.--an hour prior to the ceremony. Business apparel is required for graduates-no jeans, flip-flops, t-shirts.

Also, seniors should be aware of the district's attendance and behavior policy in regards to the graduation ceremony. No senior may have any unexcused absences or more than 4 excused absences that have not been excused in advance by the principal during the fourth quarter to participate in the commencement ceremony. This is board policy and included in the student handbook. If you have any questions, please contact the principal. Seniors are required to follow all school rules at all school activities, including the senior trip and commencement ceremony.

Please check the school district website and Facebook page for cancellations or changes in outdoor events. The calendar is very full, and changes can happen quickly because of the weather. Also be aware that changes for high school events may ripple out to impact practices for elementary or middle school students.

Three new trophy cases have been placed at the entry of the school, and all of our WIAA state team trophies have been placed there. Our wrestling team earned the runner-up trophy at the state team tournament, making that the fifth WIAA team state champion or runner-up trophy earned in the past two years.

Several students advanced to the state level for Visual Arts Classic. Amelia Broome, Sam Hinckley, Miles Aaron and Hailey Pomeroy earned gold medals. Mickayla Fitzgerald earned silver and Daniel Hanson earned honorable mention.

SCF music students performed 41 events at this spring's solo and ensemble competition. Of the 28 class A events, nine qualified for the state solo and ensemble competition, which will be held in Eau Claire on May 4th. Students who qualified are Charles Hilario in both instrumental and vocal solos, Belle VanGundy, Shane Backes, Lincoln Ferris, Miles Aaron, Oliver Bauer, Liam Roach, Will Lindberg and the Chamber Singers. At the large group festival, our upperclassmen choir earned a first in class A, our freshmen choir earned a first in class B and our band earned a second in class B.

The Forensics team did well at the Wisconsin Forensics Coaches' Association State Tournament at Sun Prairie West High School. Charles Hilario and Isabelle VanGundy took third place overall in play acting, and Amelia Broome and Tessa Hanson took fifth place in play acting.

Two seniors have been selected as WIAA Scholar Athletes. Lucy Belisle and Eli Prokop have earned this prestigious award. Congratulations to them both.






7 Ways to Support Your Child's Mental Health During Summer Vacation

Summer vacation will soon be here! For some students, this extended break from school is a welcome opportunity to relax, spend quality time with family, and start preparing for a new school year. For other students, the lack of structure and support they have grown accustomed to at school can make the <u>transition to summer vacation</u> difficult. Fortunately, whether your child is an elementary student or a teen, there are many steps you can take to support their mental health and make this summer the best one yet. Here are seven simple ways you can support your child's mental health during summer vacation.

Plan a Schedule and Stick to It

One of the biggest challenges students experience during the transition to summer vacation is a lack of structure. Although all students benefit from schedules and routines, children who struggle with mental health conditions such as anxiety and attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) tend to thrive when they know what to expect and can plan ahead. Schedules do not need to be set in stone or account for every hour of the day, but they should set basic expectations and an outline for tasks, appointments, activities, and other obligations.

Spend Time Outdoors

With long days and comfortable warm weather, summer vacation is a great opportunity to spend as much time outdoors as possible. From the sun and fresh air to physical activity, kids benefit greatly from being outdoors. Bicycling, swimming, sports, free play time, or even a family walk around the neighborhood after dinner are all excellent ways to get out of the house. Plus, time outdoors is a natural way to promote creativity and exploration while limiting screen time.

Make Time for Learning

Summer is a time for fun and relaxation, but it is also important to keep your student engaged mentally and limit learning loss from occurring while they are away from school. This summer, try to incorporate age-appropriate educational activities into your child's schedule. Visiting a museum or zoo, weekly trips to the library, keeping a journal, doing crafts, and science projects, and exploring new hobbies are all fun and effective ways to promote creativity and limit learning loss.

Think About Screen Time

Whether it is a smartphone, Netflix, or video games, most kids are attached to their electronic devices. While there is usually nothing wrong with these activities in moderation, too much screen time can have many negative effects on an adolescent's mental health. According to the American Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychology, children ages 8-12 spend as many as six hours a day using screens. Screen time increases to nine hours a day for teens. Excessive screen time is linked to anxiety/depression, behavioral problems, irregular sleep, impaired academic performance, and obesity. This summer, establish limits for screen time, familiarize yourself with the content and social media platforms your child has access to, and remember to set a good example with your own healthy screen habits.

A NOTE FROM THE MIDDLE SCHOOL

Make Healthy Choices

For many students, summer vacation is an escape from the healthy diets and habits established during the school year. While it is fine to indulge in tasty foods or take a break from physical activity every once in a while, maintaining a healthy lifestyle during the summer months is a key way to support your child's mental health. Eating healthy foods, drinking enough water, getting plenty of exercises, wearing sunscreen, remembering to wash hands, and maintaining a sleep schedule will all help your child have a healthy, fulfilling summer.

Schedule Annual Check-ups

While we're on the topic of making healthy choices, summer is a great time to schedule your family's annual visits to primary care physicians, dentists, optometrists, and therapists. During these visits, you should ask your doctor if your child is up to date on vaccinations, if they are meeting the appropriate milestones for their age, if they will need a physical to play fall sports and any other specific questions you may have. This is also a perfect time to schedule future appointments for the upcoming school year and get them on your calendar well in advance.

Monitor Behavioral Patterns

It's not uncommon for kids and teens to want to sleep more often during summer vacation or to stop doing things they once enjoyed as they grow older. For parents, it can be difficult to understand the differences between the normal ups and downs of life or something more serious like depression. As you spend more quality time with your child over summer vacation, watch for signs like feelings of sadness or anger (even over small matters), loss of interest, excessive sleep or insomnia, use of drugs or alcohol, conflict with family/friends, and low self-esteem. If you suspect something is out of the ordinary, talk with your child, be supportive, and try to determine if they need professional assistance. It's never too early to ask for help. Depression and other mental health symptoms will not get better on their own, and they often lead to further problems when left untreated.

Summer is a season of fun, relaxation, and time with family and friends, but the transition from the structure of school to long, laid-back days at home can be challenging for students and impact their mental health. Although these tips to support your child's mental health during summer vacation are helpful, it's always a good idea to seek the support of a mental health professional if you have any concerns.

FAQ

Q: How much is too much screen time for children and teens?

A: According to the AACAP, the average screen time for teens is up to nine hours per day - far more than what's ideal. While opinions differ, many experts say teens should engage in recreational screen time for two hours per day or less.

Recreational screen usage differs from educational screen time, which may be necessary for learning and school. Examples of recreational screen time include using social media, playing non-educational computer games, and watching TV. Educational screen time, like computer use for school work, is not the same as purely recreational screen time.

While ideal screen time limits for teens can vary and might differ based on opinion or the unique needs of your teenager, the AACAP recommends that parents help adolescents build healthy habits around using technology. The effects of too much time spent using screens are serious but avoidable.

Q: How do I know if my child or teen needs help with their mental health?

A: Being present and asking questions without judgment is essential in understanding how your child or teen is feeling. This will also help you determine if they need extra support. If your child or teen is having difficulty expressing themselves or is struggling with stress/anxiety, connecting with a mental health professional will allow them to get the help they need and keep any issues from worsening.

Q: How can I prepare my child for the transition back to school?

A: The transition from summer vacation to school can also impact a child or teen's mental health. Adopting a new bedtime routine in the weeks before school starts, attending school open houses, helping your child plan ahead so they know what to expect, getting organized, and encouraging a positive outlook are all great ways to smooth the transition.

Parents: This is a reminder on attendance.

Per our student handbooks, each student is allowed **ten** parent excused days each school year. A parent or guardian is required to notify the school when a child is absent from school. When taking a vacation, we require at least two days notification before being absent from school.

Students arriving late to school must sign in at the office window and receive a pass from one of the school secretaries for class. Tardy is before 8:30am; after 8:30am, your student will be marked absent. Accumulating multiple tardies, excused or unexcused, to any class, will result in detentions.

As we head to the home-stretch of the 2023/2024 school year, I'd like to share a few reminders.


- Organize your day so that children read for 20 minutes each day. This is a homework expectation for every Dresser and SCF ES student. If your little darling can't read, please read to her/him.

Growth in Girls Wrestling- SCF helping to lead the Pack!

Taken from Wisconsin Wrestling Federation- "On June 24th, 2020, the Wisconsin Wrestling Coaches Association and the Coaches' Advisory Committee submitted a proposal to the WIAA Board of Control to add an all-girls division in the state championship series for wrestling. It was unanimously voted on as yes, 10-0.

Hard-nosed visionaries creating opportunities and creating visibility—that's what has led us to this historic weekend for Wisconsin. What was an occasional female wrestler on the mats mixed into brackets with boys is now commonplace.

For the first time ever, Wisconsin will have an official association-backed championship for the girls.

More than 400 girls went through OPC testing (weight management) in Wisconsin this season and the <u>WIAA</u> championship event at the La Crosse Center on Saturday will showcase the largest tournament in state history. There are 261 wrestlers registered."

Since 2020 girls wrestling in Wisconsin has grown rapidly, and St. Croix Falls has been a trailblazing program, especially for Northwest Wisconsin and smaller schools.

INFORMATION FROM THE NURSE



Attention parents of children going into 4K, Kindergarten and 7th grade Fall 2024

If you have not received a letter you should be receiving it soon. This letter is regarding your child needing immunizations prior to the start of school Fall 2024 per the Wisconsin law. If you decline to immunize then a waiver will need to be completed and signed. Please watch for this letter.

4K Students will need the following immunizations:

- 4 DTaP/DTP/DT
- 3 Polio
- 3 Hepatitis B
- 1 MMR
- 1 Varicella

Kindergarten Students will need the following immunizations:

- 4 DTaP/DTP/DT
- 4 Polio

7th Grade Students will need the following immunizations:

- 4 DTaP/DTP/DT

1 Tdap

Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis (Tdap) booster. This one-time injection is the key to increasing your child's resistance to Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis (Whooping Cough). The Wisconsin Immunization law requires a dose of this vaccine to attend school in the seventh grade. If decline, a waiver will need to be completed.

TOO Sick for School? When to stay home

- 1. Fever: 100.4 F or greater. Student may return to school when fever-free for 24 hours without using any fever reducing medications.
- 2. Vomiting/Diarrhea: Any unexplained vomiting episode. May return 24 hours after last episode. Diarrhea=three or more unexplained episodes of watery or loose stool in 24 hours OR sudden onset of loose stools. May return 24 hours after last episode.
- 3. Cough: Serious, sustained coughing, shortness of breath, or difficulty breathing. Consult with a health care provider.
- 4. Rash: Any new rash accompanied by fever. May return after rash goes away and fever free or clearance given by health care provider.
- 5. Skin Lesions/Sores: Drainage from a sore that cannot be contained within a bandage OR sores are increasing in size OR new sores are developing day-to-day. Consult with a health care provider





Information on Head Lice

An estimated 6 to 12 million infestations occur each year in the United States, most often among children ages 3 to 11 years of age.

Head lice are not dangerous. They do not transmit disease, but they spread easily. Head lice are tiny, wingless insects that live close to the human scalp and feed on human blood. The eggs (nits) are tiny, tear-drop shaped; and attach to the hair shaft and are often found around the nap of the neck or ears. Nits may appear yellowish or white and can look similar to dandruff. But, unlike dandruff, they can be difficult to remove. Baby lice (nymphs) are smaller and grow to adult size in 1-2 weeks. Adult lice are the size of a sesame seed and are tan to grayish-white. Lice crawl, they do not fly or jump.

Infestation can occur at home, school or in the community. Head lice are mostly spread by direct head to head contact – for example, during play at home or school, slumber parties, sports activities or camp. Sometimes, head lice are spread via objects that were in recent contact with a person infected by head

lice, such as hats scarves, combs, brushes, hair attachments, etc. It is very important to check your students hair throughout the school year.

HEAD LICE TREATMENT RECOMMENDATIONS

- Examine each family member's head. A magnifying glass in good light may help. Wash your hands between examinations.
- Consult with your doctor or go to the pharmacy for a lice killing product. Follow the directions on the labels or inserts of the medicated product.
- Promptly treat all members of the family who have head lice. Follow the product directions
 exactly!!! If your child has very thick or long hair, 2 treatment packages may be needed.
- Each head lice treatment product is different and instructions vary. It is EXTREMELY important to follow the directions included with the product you choose to use.
- Some lice killing products are applied to dry hair. If the lice killing product recommends shampooing hair prior to use, do not use a combination shampoo/conditioner or conditioner.
- Lice killing products should be applied and rinsed at a sink, not in the shower or bathtub, to avoid unnecessary chemical exposure. Protect the neck, ears, and face with a dry towel. Make sure the child is comfortable as this process takes several minutes.
- Do not wash the hair for 1-2 days after treatment for lice.
- It is not necessary, but hair can be combed with a fine-tooth nit comb or tweezers to remove all nits (eggs).
- Remove mattress pads, sheets, pillowcases, and blankets from beds. Wash and dry on hot setting
- Put pillows, non-washable bedding, stuffed toys, furniture throw pillows, etc. in a dryer set on hot for 30 minutes; or seal them on a plastic bag for 7-14 days.
- · Make beds with clean linen.
- Thoroughly vacuum all mattresses, upholstered furniture, carpet, car seats, and seats in the car/s, especially around buttons.
- Wash all jackets, sweaters, hats, and other clothing that may have come in contact with head lice in the last 3-4 days.
- Take non-washable clothing to the dry cleaners or use an alternative treatment: dyer for 30 minutes or seal in plastic bag for 7-14 days.

- Notify all people who were in contact with any family member with head lice in the past week. Inform them, they must check for head lice/nits, treat persons with head lice/nits and do thorough house cleaning. This step is important to avoid re-infestation.
- Many products require another treatment in 7 to 10 days. Check product inserts or labels for details.
- Do not use the product more often than the directions state. Do not use the product to prevent head lice. The risk is developing immunity to the product.

HOW TO EXAMINE FOR HEAD LICE

Use bright light to look at:

- Crown of head
- Bangs
- Behind both ears
- Mape of neck

How to inspect

- Place gloves on your hands
- Use fingers to separate hair and create a part. The part should allow you to clearly see the person's scalp.
- 3 Look for lice crawling on the scalp where the hair is parted or on the hair shaft. The lice will be dark in color and the size of a poppyseed.
- 4 Look for nits near hair follicle about ¼ inch from scalp. Nits (eggs) will be white or yellowish-brown. Nits are often more easily seen than lice, especially when the person has dark hair.
- 6 Also look behind both ears and near the back of the neck. You may see lice

To distinguish between dandruff and nits, try to flick or pull off the white speck. Dandruff is easily pulled off, but nits are not.

Change gloves between each child's examination and wash your hands after all examinations are completed.
